British Sign Language Awareness Week

Sign Language Week is celebrated each year in March to coincide with the <u>anniversary of the recognition</u> <u>of British Sign Language</u> (BSL) by the UK Government in 2003. Sign Language Week is an initiative of the <u>British Deaf Association</u> (BDA). This year's Sign Language Week runs from 14th – 20th March 2022. The theme this year will be "BSL Brings Us Together".

We are fortunate at Marsh Hill in that we have a parent with expertise in the field of sign language (Mrs. Bryant-Myers) and she came into school on Wednesday to deliver a special whole school assembly about the importance of sign language as a means of providing full access to communication for many deaf and hard-of-hearing people.

Mrs. Bryant-Myers taught the children how to sign the alphabet and a number of useful words and phrases including, 'please', 'thank you', 'good morning', 'how are you' and 'my name is...'

I am delighted that she will be returning to the school to carry out workshops in each year group over the course of the term.

Congratulations and well done also to Nella who won $\mathbf{1}^{\text{st}}$ place in a City of Birmingham Gymnastics Competition.


Reading Inspirations
