Mrs. Sturridge-Packer also showed us a video recording of the ceremony.

There was an alfresco lunch held in the style of a street party and this was followed by 'street' games from down the years of the Queen's reign.



In the afternoon, Year 6 recreated the Coronation in front of the whole school (who cheered and waved their flags throughout).

We ended our special and momentous Jubilee celebrations with the whole school singing the National Anthem. The children also signed the words using British Sign Language (BSL). This has been taught to all the children (and staff) in school from Reception to Year 6, by one of our fabulous parents, Faye Bryant-Myers.


Reading Inspirations
