<u>Mr. Kelly</u>

Yesterday (Thursday 9th March), we were privileged to welcome Mr. James Kelly to school to speak with our Year 6 pupils who have been learning about World War II as part of their History Topic. Mr. Kelly is a World War II veteran who served as a Rifleman and Machine Gunner. As a boy, he lived in one room with his family (there were seven of them). Mr Kelly left school at the age of 14 to become a van driver's mate and at the age of 15 volunteered to join the army. His three younger siblings were evacuees who were relocated to the countryside. Mr. Kelly's initial training was in the Royal Irish Fusilliers and he later transferred to The Royal Ulster Rifles. Mr. Kelly told us that when the war began it seemed like "a big adventure", because he had grown up watching Western films where cowboys were shot but you "never saw any blood; but you soon learnt that it wasn't like that."

Mr. Kelly, served at Normandy (he was there between June 5th and August 24th, 1944); and on Christmas Eve of that year he and his Regimen were given two hours' notice before being sent to Belgium to take part in the Battle of the Bulge (also known as the Ardennes Offensive).

On VE Day, Mr. Kelly's Commanding Officers gave the Regiment permission to play football, and during the match, he fell and broke his wrist: the only injury he sustained during World War II. Mr. Kelly showed us the nine medals that he was awarded for his service in the Military (including the Legion of Honour, which was presented to him by the French Government on the 70th Anniversary of the D-Day Landings for his part in the liberation of France: the Legion of Honour is the highest French Order of Merit.

Mr. Kelly is a truly inspirational character; when he was in his eighties, he studied towards a maths degree with the Open University and today, at the age of 96, he still attends the gym three times a week.
