
## **Marsh Hill Newsletter**

Dear Parents and Carers,

I hope this newsletter finds you well and that you all had a lovely extended weekend celebrating King Charles III's Coronation. The children at Marsh Hill certainly enjoyed the occasion when we celebrated as a school community on Friday 5<sup>th</sup> May. The children did activities based on the Coronation in the morning followed by a 'street party' style lunch. After lunch the children had a 'Green Fayre' and played traditional games such as 'Kick the Can', 'Please Mr Crocodile' and 'Hot Potato.'

#### **Key stage 2 SATs**

I would like to congratulate all our wonderful Year 6 pupils who have taken their Standard Assessment Tests (SATs) this week. SATs are formal tests that take place every May for Year 6 pupils. Children are assessed in the following areas: Grammar, Punctuation and Spelling; Reading and Maths. The completed test papers are sent away to be externally marked. Parents and children will receive their results in July.

#### **Key stage 1 SATs**

Key stage 1 SATs are taken every May by children in Year 2. These tests assess children's ability in reading; grammar, punctuation and spelling, and maths and are carried out informally - this means that they are not timed and take place in a normal classroom situation. Children in Year 2 at Marsh Hill began their SATs on Wednesday 10<sup>th</sup> May.

#### **British Values**

What are British Values? Fundamental British Values underpin what it is to be a citizen in a modern and diverse Great Britain valuing our community and celebrating diversity of the UK. These values are Democracy, Rule of Law, Respect and Tolerance, Individual Liberty.

#### **Democracy at Marsh Hill**

Democracy is embedded at Marsh Hill. Pupils are always listened to by adults and are taught to listen carefully and with concern to each other; respecting the right of every

individual to have their opinions and voices heard. Pupils also have the opportunity to air their opinions and ideas through our School Council and regular questionnaires where the children can put forward their views of the school. The elections of the School Council and Anti Bullying ambassadors are based solely on pupil votes. Candidates make speeches, pupils consider characteristics important for an elected representative and vote in secret using ballot boxes. This process reflects our British electoral system and demonstrates democracy in action.

#### Safeguarding

Last week, your child will have brought home a letter about two online safety workshops we will be holding for parents in school on Thursday 25<sup>th</sup> May. You may attend at either 9.00 a.m. or 2.30 p.m. The internet is an amazing resource, but one that is always changing. The workshop will help you to support your children stay safe and protected online. I would like as many parents to turn up for one of these sessions as possible, so please complete the reply slip attached to the letter. #### <u>Spotlight on the Curriculum – Science</u>

Our pupils have big dreams, ambitious goals, and exciting aspirations. They plan their adult life at the age of 5 years old, when they decide they want to be a doctor when they grow up. They may also aspire to be a pharmacist, an astronaut or an archaeologist. In order to facilitate these goals, we treat our pupils as skilled scientists when we immerse them in their Science lessons. We aim to instil confidence and inspire future scientists, and that begins when they start to develop their understanding about the world around them when they are in the Early Years Foundation Stage (Reception). Pupils in EYFS work towards being an "Exceptional Explorer" through planned adult led activities and child initiated activities in the continuous provision.

The teaching and learning of Science puts the learner at the heart of the process. During lessons, pupils will explore and record their initial ideas at the beginning of each unit. They will then participate in rich learning experiences to help them develop their understanding of science ideas and concepts. This includes working scientifically (as scientists), when they are enabled to develop skills such as: predicting, observing, classifying, recording, interpreting and evaluating.


'Cat in the Hat is funny and it rhymes, like 'bump and jump', 'sunny and funny' and 'fish and wish.'
