Mental Health and Wellbeing





#ToHelpMyAnxiety

This week is Mental Health Awareness Week. Here at Marsh Hill, supporting mental health in school is everyone's responsibility. We are always available to listen to the children who are having problems and also to listen to those who aren't. Good mental health means that we are here to listen to children when they simply want to talk or share their experiences with us. We take what they say seriously, we encourage their interests and build positive relationships with them; and this begins from the minute they walk into school in the morning.

Children experience difficult situations, tragic circumstances just like adults do and sometimes it is as simple as them not being able to explain why they feel 'off colour' or can't engage in their learning - having a trusted adult to talk to can make all the difference and can help to upskill the children to become more resilient - developing the skills to cope with their own emotions and in doing so prepare them for their futures. So how do we do this at Marsh Hill? In school we provide a Pastoral Team whom offer a variety of interventions including emotion regulation, mentoring, anger management, conflict resolution, and social skills groups, to name just a few. We offer bespoke programs for children with complex needs and can refer children to Forward Thinking Birmingham or to the STICK Team which is an Early Help intervention for mental health issues.

We provide many resources which includes a well-equipped sensory room to help those children who are struggling with sensory overload and emotional regulation. We offer a Pastoral Nurture group at lunchtime for children whom struggle during independent play. Forest Schools is an exciting additional initiative for us and we use this to promote self-esteem and self-confidence. We have also invested in procuring Counselling and Play Therapy from Urban Devotion Birmingham and an Art Therapist.


Your child is an individual and their mental health needs are as unique as they are - we aim to offer the most appropriate support to ensure that they thrive.

British Values

Fundamental British Values underpin what it is to be a citizen in a modern and diverse Great Britain valuing our community and celebrating diversity of the UK. These values are Democracy, Rule of Law, Respect and Tolerance, Individual Liberty.

Rule of Law at Marsh Hill

At Marsh Hill, the importance of rules and law, whether they are by those that govern our school or our country, are referred to and reinforced often; such as in assemblies and when reflecting on behaviour choices. The school rules are clearly understood by all and seen to be necessary to ensure that every pupil in our school is able to learn in a safe and orderly environment.

Pupils are taught the value and reasons behind laws and that they govern and protect us; the responsibilities that this involves and the consequences when laws are broken. These values are reinforced in a variety of ways at Marsh Hill:

- School rules and expectations are clear and fair;
- Class rules and celebration of adhering to these rules;
- We help pupils to distinguish right from wrong;
- We help to respect the law and the basis on which it is made;
- We help to understand that living under the rule of law protects individuals;
- Visits from the Police, who carry out workshops in each year group annually
- During PSHE, when we explore laws and what to do if peer pressure is trying to persuade our children to break them
- During other subjects, where there is respect and appreciation for different rules

<u>Spotlight on the Curriculum – History</u>

The History curriculum at Marsh Hill aims to provide children with a coherent understanding of Britain's past and that of the wider world. Our aims are to fulfil the requirements of the National Curriculum for history; providing a broad and balanced curriculum; ensuring the progressive development of historical concepts, knowledge and skills; and for the children to develop a love for history. Furthermore, we aim to inspire in pupils a curiosity and fascination about history that will lead to pupils leaving Marsh Hill wanting to know more. Pupils in EYFS work towards being an "Exceptional Explorer" through planned adult led activities and child initiated activities in the continuous provision.

The aims of teaching history in our school are:

• to inspire pupils' curiosity to discover more about the past and to develop an understanding that enables them to enjoy all that history has to offer;

- to enable children to know about significant events in British history and to appreciate how things have changed over time;
- to develop a good sense of chronology;
- to have some knowledge and understanding of historical development in the wider world;
- to help children understand society and their place within it, so that they develop a sense of their own cultural heritage;
- to develop in children the skills of enquiry, investigation, analysis, evaluation, debate, interpretation, problem solving and presentation.

We aim to provide a curriculum that is meaningful and engages our children. To teach history effectively, we look to teach and implement key skills throughout a broad range of topics. We aim to equip children with skills, vital knowledge and deep understanding that they need as they develop their own historical perceptions.
