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Safeguarding

Safeguarding is the action that is taken to promote the welfare of children and protect them from harm. Safeguarding means:

- Protecting children from abuse and maltreatment
- Preventing harm to children's health or development
- Ensuring children grow up with the provision of safe and effective care
- Taking action to enable all children and young people to have the best outcomes.

Schools, as with all organisations that work with or come into contact with children (such as voluntary and community organisations, faith groups, private sector providers, hospitals and sports clubs) have safeguarding policies and procedures to ensure that every child, regardless of their age, disability, gender, race, religion or belief has a right to equal protection from harm. Setting up and following good safeguarding policies and procedures means children are safe from adults and other children who might pose a risk. Safeguarding is the action that is taken to promote the welfare of children and protect them from harm.

Child protection is part of the safeguarding process. It focuses on protecting individual children identified as suffering or likely to suffer significant harm. This includes child protection procedures which detail how to respond to concerns about a child.

Focus on the Curriculum – Phonics

Phonics is an approach to teaching some aspects of literacy, by developing pupils' knowledge and understanding of the relationship between written symbols and sounds. The aim is to systematically teach pupils the relationship between these sounds and the written spelling patterns, or graphemes, which represent them. Phonics emphasises the skills of decoding new words by sounding them out and combining or 'blending' the sound-spelling patterns.

Research carried out by the Education Endowment Fund states that: "Phonics has a positive impact with very extensive evidence and is an important component in the development of early reading skills ... it Improves the accuracy of the child's reading.... Phonics approaches have been consistently effective in supporting younger pupils to master the basics of reading."

At Marsh Hill, all planning is systematic and progressive and is in line with the school's long-term plan. Phonics is taught by highly skilled practitioners. Resources, terminology and phrases used to facilitate the teaching of phonics is uniform across the school. Phonics teaching is prioritised and is taught discreetly for 25 minutes every morning. Children are taught in ability groups, across their year group. Groups are determined through rigorous assessment, so that the teaching of phonics is matched to the children's current level of skill and phonemic awareness.

Each session follows the same systematic structure of:

- Revisit (previous sounds and common exception words taught),
- Teach (new sound and Common Exception Words)
- Practise
- Apply new sounds and words taught in word/sentence reading and writing.

The sounds and words taught are divided into 3 progressive stages and the expectations of coverage are:

Phase 2, 3 and 4: Taught in Reception

Phase 5: Taught throughout Year One

Phase 6: Year 2. Once children have a good command of phonic knowledge and use this competently to blend and segment, children move onto learning the rules of spelling.
